

### ON AUTHENTIC MARIAN SPIRITUALITY

EXCERPTS FROM THE HOLY FATHER'S MEDITATION AT THE PRAYER VIGIL FOR PEACE DURING THE JUBILEE OF MARIAN SPIRITUALITY, ON OCTOBER 11

uring this Jubilee of Marian Spirituality, we believers turn our gaze to the Virgin Mary, who guides us on our pilgrimage of hope. We look to her human and evangelical virtues, the imitation of which constitutes the most authentic Marian devotion (cf. Dogmatic Constitution on the Church Lumen Gentium, 65.67). Like her, the first of all believers, we aspire to be a welcoming vessel for the Most High, a "humble tent of the Word, moved only by the motions of the Holy Spirit" (Saint John Paul II, Angelus, 15 August 1988). Like her, the first of the disciples, we ask for the gift of a listening heart that opens itself as part of a welcoming cosmos. Through her, Woman of sorrow, strength, and faith, we ask for the gift of compassion toward every brother and sister who suffers and toward all creatures. Let us look to the Mother of Jesus and the small group of courageous women at the foot of the cross. May we learn from them to stand beside the countless crosses of the world, where Christ is still crucified in his brothers and sisters, in order to bring them comfort, communion and help. We can identify with Mary as a member of the human family, and borrowing the words of a poet, we say to her: "Mother, you are every woman who loves; Mother, you are every mother who weeps for a child killed, a child betrayed. These children who are never fully killed" (D. M. Turoldo). We seek refuge under your protection, Virgin of Easter, together with all those in whom the Passion of your Son continues. During this Jubilee of Marian Spirituality, our hope is guided by the gentle and persistent light of Mary's words as recounted in the Gospel. Her last words at the wedding feast in Cana are particularly precious. Referring to Jesus, she said to the servants, "Do

"Do whatever he tells you. 'Blessed are you, the peacemakers' (Mt 5:9). We are dedicated to embodying the Lord's profound words, making them a part of our very being, our legacy and our actions."

whatever he tells you" (Jn 2:5). This was the last time she spoke. These words, which almost seem to be a testament, must be treasured by her children, as any mother's testament would be.


Whatever he tells you. She is certain that the Son will speak; that his word is not yet final; that he continues to create, generate and work; that he fills the world with springtime and the amphorae of the feast with wine. Like a beacon, Mary points beyond herself, showing that the final destination is the Lord Jesus and his word: the center toward which

everything converges; the axis around which time and eternity revolve. Follow his word, she urges. Live the Gospel: embody it, living it out with determination and joy. Live the Gospel and life will be transformed from being empty and dull to something full and vibrant.



### JUBILEE OF PRISONERS

n December 14, let all MI Knights celebrate with the universal Church the Jubilee of Prisoners. The following is a testimony from an MI member who is currently incarcerated. God bless you all! This letter-style is unfamiliar to me, so bear with me... I am writing from a position of great humility as I write from a prison cell.... a story becoming all too familiar. A life plagued by addiction, gangs, violence, selfishness, and obvious crime. My life since thirteen years of age has been in the custody of the state more than not. I am serving a natural sentence without the possibility of parole. I am guilty of almost every sin you can imagine, and some maybe you can't even imagine. I have destroyed lives in extreme ways... and the wake of my life's ripple effect is beyond any earthly scale of measurement, and sadly I must face this. In 2020, I was blessed with a paradigm shift of sorts, allowing me a new perspective. I soon renounced my affiliations, placing an extermination order out on me by those who once called me brother, those I placed my life on the line for time and time again. After prison administration attempted to have me request protective custody, and me signing a refusal, after failed attempts on my life, the administration was inspired to deem me to be high profile, and that meant it was no longer an option for me. They would not allow for my ego to lead me into a brutal and violent death. I was humiliat-

ed by being placed in protective custody, a major shame, but one I needed to begin my journey of self discovery. In renoucing my affiliations, being placed in P.C. I essentially renounced the person I had spent 40 years existing as. That reputation no longer mattered. Fast forward. I am currently a Mental Health Peer Assistant serving the 200+ peers in my location. I didn't just arrive here with no struggle. I had to process all my past traumas, abuse, and then all the guilt and shame for all my life's choices. I came into an all out spiritual battle... that had been going on all my life, but I became ever so aware of, finally. The adversary beat me down with guilt, shame, loneliness, and a hopeless outlook in regards to my existence with a natural sentence. When suicide was the only thing I believed [could] bring me some liberation, without any Catholic upbringing, one day I cried out and I experi-

enced our Blessed Mother's presence (beyond words, so I go silent in my explanation of the experience). She tended my wounds...This led me to reach out to the [Catholic] Archdiocese... I knew Catholics venerate Mary, full of grace and truth. I began OCIA last year after meeting every third Tuesday with Fr. J. who came from the Archidiocese. I had no classroom setting. I studied alone and eventually brought in another peer, and on May 13, Our Lady of Fatima day, we received the Sacraments of Initiation, confirming me a member of Holy Mother Church. I took on the baptismal name of Maximilian as St. Maximilian Kolbe became my patron saint. I knew only a little bit about St. Maximilian, but I felt attracted or drawn to him. I love how he asked for both crowns and wore them courageously. I believe that our Holy Queen, enveloping me within the safety of her womb, allowed me to grow closer to Christ as well, and I was nurtured beyond words. This makes me feel closer to St. Maximilian Kolbe, and i know my journey is just beginning. I beleive I'll become a certified catechist, and over ten people have agreed to enroll in OCIA this year.... I feel I have been restored to life... ves. a life sentence, but one now to serve God. I believe that our Blessed Mother Mary nurtured me for some significant [purpose], and I yearn to share Mary, for it has been through her womb that I personally discovered Christ. Now when I speak of the Gospel, I speak of its fullness, to include the *Theotokos*, as without her the Gospel does not exist; all those sects birthed from the reformation are missing out on the Good News of eternal salvation, while everyone will find our relationship with Jesus strenghtened once we choose to act as the beloved disciple who, at Jesus' request upon the cross, "took Mary" as Mother, and cared for her from that moment on. God bless you all, and thank you for your time. With our Beloved Mother and our St. Maximilian Kolbe, Kelly Maximilian



It brings tears of joy and hope. Christmas is such a great time of peace and joy, a feeling within me I wish I could preserve and cherish always. I pray for all our MI members that they will embrace this Christmas season with a new sense of joy and hope and pass this excitement onto everyone they meet. 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

The Martyr of Charity, St. Maximilian Maria Kolbe (1894-1941), before his death in the Auschwitz concentration camp, had spent the previous twenty-three years as a priest, evangelizer, media mogul, social commentator, missionary and religious reformer. His life's work cut short at age 47, St. Kolbe nonetheless left behind an impressive body of writings. In the 1950s the English-speaking world first began reading bits and pieces of those writings translated from the original Polish, Italian and Latin. The publication of the first English critical edition, The Writings of St. Maximilian Maria Kolbe, constitutes a historic event for the English-speaking readership. The sublime inspiration of the Saint's Marian thought and spirituality transpires from every page of his writings, whether it be a treatise on the relationship between the Holy Spirit and the Immaculate Conception, an evangelization plan, a message of counsel to religious and laity, or a filial letter to his mother. His deep personal relationship with the Immaculate Virgin Mary colors and enflames nearly every page. His leitmotif is love for God, the Church, the world and all its peoples. His goal is the conversion and sanctification of that world.



Because the frenetic pace of St. Kolbe's active ministry afforded him no time to compose a theological Summa, this edition assembles together the wide scope of his extant writings into a unified synthesis. It represents a virtual magnum opus of Kolbean thought-- at one and the same

magnum opus of Kolbean thought-- at one and the same time pastoral, anthropological, philosophical, spiritual, ascetical and mystical. In the person of St. Maximilian Maria Kolbe, the first half of the twentieth century found a fresh voice fearlessly defending timeless values in the contemporary context. These two volumes give vigorous new life to this prophetic voice of truth.

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#### ON THE DOCTRINAL NOTE ON SOME MARIAN TITLES

Dear Friends.

I share some reflections after my initial reading of the document from the Dicastery for the Doctrine of the Faith, which I found rather uplifting.

The document, "without intending to be comprehensive and exhaustive," as stated in the *Introduction*, reflects beautifully on Our Lady's unique role, willingly and joyfully subordinate to her Son, on her maternal participation and cooperation in the work of Salvation carried out by her Son, our Savior and sole Mediator, and on her spiritual motherhood and the effectiveness of her maternal intercession.

This is a Doctrinal Note, not a papal document like an Apostolic Exhortation or Encyclical, and yet it's indeed replete with references to Scripture and the teaching of saints and popes. In fact, a careful reading of the document reveals how it resonates with many of St. Maximilian Kolbe's teachings!

The document in no way seeks to diminish our devotion to Our Lady, but rather to enhance it, as stated in the *Presentation*: "Rather than proposing limits, the Note seeks to accompany and sustain the love of Mary and trust in her maternal intercession." It does want to call our attention to a couple of Marian titles that have been used for centuries by the people of God, including saints and popes, but that the Dicastery, with the approval of the Holy Father, deems could cause some theological confusion. Therefore, the document suggested that they are to be either avoided as "not appropriate" in defining Mary's unique cooperation in the salvific work of her Son (as is the case of "co-Redemptrix") or used with caution "or special prudence" (as in the case of "Mediatrix"), preferring other titles that convey the correct, rich meaning of Our Lady's cooperation and maternal care without risking to cause doctrinal ambiguity.

Indeed, many popes and saints, including St. Maximilian Kolbe and the newly proclaimed Doctor of the Church, St. John Henry Newman, used the titles co-Redemptrix and Mediatrix of Grace/Mediatrix of All Graces. They unambiguously emphasized that her unique maternal role is subordinate to and totally dependent on Christ, the only Savior of man and our sole Mediator. Their teaching reechoes in St. John Paul II's Encyclical Redemptoris Mater: "'Mary's maternal function towards mankind in no way obscures or diminishes the unique mediation of Christ, but rather shows its efficacy,' because 'there is one mediator between God and men, the man Christ Jesus' (1 Tim 2:5). This maternal role of Mary flows, according to God's good pleasure, 'from the superabundance of the merits of Christ; it is founded on his mediation, absolutely depends on it, and draws all its efficacy from it.' (Lumen Gentium, n. 60). It is precisely in this sense that the episode at Cana in Galilee offers us a sort of first announcement of Mary's mediation, wholly oriented towards Christ and tending to the revelation of his salvific power." (n. 22 and ff. - See also Part III - Maternal Mediation, nn. 38-50). As for St. Maximilian in particular, he was a contemporary of Cardinal Mercier, who promoted the definition of the dogma of Mary's universal mediation. Not surprisingly, St. Maximilian, in his great love for Our Lady, supported those efforts. And yet, how would be respond to the current document? I believe he would have responded with respectful, whole-hearted obedience and prayer, and likewise, he would want us to do the same.

The Church, through this Doctrinal Note, is not calling for a "revision" of the writings and teachings of the saints (whose writings have been carefully scrutinized in the process leading to their canonization!) and, in the case of popes, the Magisterial documents that are part of the patrimony of the Church. It is important to note that this document does not negate what saints and popes have said, nor does it declare it inappropriate. It's a prudential judgement (and not necessarily the last word on the subject) that should be respected and not vilified, even if one does not fully agree with it.

The most important thing is not to jump on it (as some commentators, unfortunately, tend to do), but to take time for reflection, prayer, and listening to wise, trusted voices. Let us continue with peace, joy, and zeal to promote love and devotion to our beautiful Mother, who always leads us to Jesus!




### ST. MAXIMILIAN WRITES...

AN ARTICLE ABOUT THE MI SPIRITUAL CARE OF INMATES (KW 1121).



or some time now we have been receiving letters in which we are asked toconcede to action in favor of the spiritual care of prisoners. And rightly so, because, as is written in one of these letters, the Militia of the Immaculata has as its purpose the conversion of sinners, and it is precisely in prisons that offenders are collected. One person suggests a concrete project for such assistance, on the basis of an experiment carried out in a small town: "In our town we have a preventive prison. Here one cannot create a school, because the detainees are kept only for a short time, but with respect to the possibility of opening a reading room, the chief warden has stated that such a thing would be very desirable. So I took out a subscription to several Catholic publications... and I have delivered them to the chaplain who celebrates Holy Mass in prison every month. There is no chapel, but on that day an altar is set up in the hallway. We have up to 340 prisoners, half of whom are Catholics, the rest coming from other denominations. Furthermore, I invited other people to give me their magazines and books, and they have willingly gone along with my proposal. In this way, by providing continuously and reliably something to read, a reading room will be set up in prison, without great effort and expense. If only we could do something like that in every city where there is a prison, especially in smaller cities and towns where society does not think at all about prisoners and does nothing for them!" And this activity has not been fruitless, because right from

O Prisoner-Saint of Auschwitz. help me in my plight. Introduce me to Mary, the Immaculata, Mother of God. She prayed for Jesus in a Jerusalem jail. She prayed for you in a Nazi prison camp. Ask her to comfort me in my confinement. May she teach me always to be good. If I am lonely, may she say, "God is here." If I feel hate, may she say, "God is love." If I am tempted, may she say, "God is pure." If I sin, may she say, "God is mercy." If I am in darkness, may she say, "God is light." If I am unjustly condemned, may she say, "God is truth." If I have pain in soul or body, may she say, "God is peace." If I lose hope, may she say: "God is with you all days, and so am I." Amen.

Rekindle love and trust in Mary Immaculate everywhere and you shall soon see tears flowing from the eyes of the most hardened sinners. You shall see prisons emptied... peace and happiness will destroy discord and pain, for it will be already a new era."

that very prison we received a letter from a repented prisoner, arrested in August 1925, in which, among other things, he expresses himself in the following terms: "Here in prison I have for the first time held in my hands the magazine that you, Reverend Fathers, published and which is consecrated to the devotion of the Blessed Virgin Mary conceived without sin, and after reading the very edifying examples of piety and devotion offered at the altar of the Most Holy Mother, I, a man stained with sins and iniquities, longed to become one of her Knights." He concluded his confession with a sincere desire for improvement: "I burn with the desire to repent of all my past life, and do not exclude, when merciful God will allow it, to come to you, Reverend Father, to ask for spiritual nourishment. Today I present you, Reverend Father, with only one request: Please allow me to become a Knight of the Immaculata, recommend me to the prayers of the faithful, and I hope that the Blessed Virgin will obtain the grace for me from the Lord of hosts, and will pull me out of the moral misery into which sin has plunged me and allow me to become her devoted son, while her graces will never again allow me to abandon the path of virtue and will make me a believer and faithful child of God the Father." That member of the Militia of the Immaculata, therefore, has completely fulfilled the purpose of the Militia.... Who knows how many souls can be saved in this way!... In how many souls the Immaculata will be able to consolidate her kingdom! How many will she make happy!...

That Advent and Christmas seasons may be times to deepen our relationship with you and your Son.

"Once again I warmly reciprocate the good wishes sent to me on the occasion of Christmas and the New Year that is now approaching, and hope that the Immaculata may ever more perfectly take possession of the hearts of all of us and of all people throughout the world." (KW 655)

Reflection - In December. we celebrate the Immaculate Conception and Christmas. St. Maximilian Kolbe meditated on Mary's identity as the Immaculate Conception nd on the mystery of the Nativity of the Lord. May we turn to the Immaculata, whose love was pure, so she may help us to respond fully to the love of God revealed to us this

Christmas. "The Immaculata never had any stain of sin, which means that her love was always full, without flaws. She loved God with all her being, and love united her with God in this perfect fashion from the first instant of her life, such that on the day of the Annunciation, the Angel could address her saying: 'Full of grace, the Lord is with thee' [Lk 1:28]." (KW 1320). May we allow the Immaculata to lead us to the Sacred Heart of Jesus where His mercy will purify us and His love will fill us. May we ask the Immaculata to help us enter more deeply into the mystery of the Nativity as we remember the birth of Jesus through her heart. "There He is before you now, in the form of a weak newborn child. What feelings of humility, love and gratitude must have filled your heart at that time. . . as you marveled at the humility, love and gratitude that the Incarnate had toward you. I beg you, fill my heart too with your humility, your love, your gratitude!" (KW 1236)

Let me be a fit instrument in your immaculate and merciful hands for introducing and increasing your glory to the maximum in all the many strayed and indifferent souls, and thus help extend as far as possible the blessed Kingdom of the most Sacred Heart of Jesus. For wherever you enter, you obtain the grace of conversion and growth in holiness, since it is through your hands that all graces come to us from the most Sacred Heart of Jesus.
