Dear Knights of the Immaculata, I hope you are starting the new year with a renewed sense of lov in your hearts, the joy that only Christ can bring. January brings us a new year, a new opportunity to honor our Blessed Mother and let her lead us closer to her Son, our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. This month we celebrate Our Mother, the Mother of God, and her Son being revealed to the world on the feast of the Epiphany of the Lord. On January 1st we celebrate the Solemnity of Mary, Mother of God, (Theotokos) officially declared a dogma in 431 AD at the council of Ephesus, which affirmed that Jesus is one person with both divine and human natures, making Mary the one who gave birth to God, the God-bearer. This dogma was done to settle the Christological controversy caused by Nestorius, the Archbishop of Constantinople, who tried to argue that Mary was only Christotokos, meaning "birth giver of Christ." This implied that Jesus could be divided. He affirmed that Mary is the Mother of Christ, a man, but not the mother of a divine person who became man. At the council of Ephesus, they rejected this notion and declared Mary the Theotokos, the God-bearer, and not merely

the Christotokos. This may sound like a very small difference, but it is a very different view of lesus. The term Christotokos means that Christ can be divided, part man and part God, but Theotokos means Jesus is fully God and fully Man. So, this month let's celebrate the true Mother of Jesus Christ, who is both Divine We are getting close to the end and Human.

The Epiphany marks the arrival of the Magi. They came from afar to worship and bring gifts to Baby Jesus, symbolizing Christ being revealed to the world, a gift for all of mankind. We have a chance to mark our homes with the Epiphany chalk blessing. We

can bless our homes for the new vear with the initials of Caspar, Melchior, and Balthasar on the lintel of the door using the blessed chalk, blessed by the priest. The initials C, M, and B stand for Christus Mansionem Benedicat, May Christ bless this house, (20 + C + M + B + 26).

of the Christmas season, which I hope has been a joyful and heartfelt time for you as it has been for myself and my family. We have a busy year ahead of us, beginning with making the MI present to as many people as possible. 

The Holy Father's prayer at the Spanish Steps on December 8, 2025

ail, O Mary! Rejoice, full of grace, filled with that grace which, like a gentle light, makes radiant all those on whom the presence of God shines. The Mystery has wrapped around you from the beginning; from your mother's womb it began to accomplish great things in you, things that soon asked for your consent—that "Yes" which inspired so many other "yeses." Immaculate one, Mother of a faithful people, your purity bathes Rome in eternal light, your path fills its streets with a fragrance sweeter than the flowers we offer you today [December 8]. Many pilgrims from all over the world, O Immaculate Virgin, have walked the streets of this city throughout history and in this Jubilee Year. A humanity tested, at times crushed, humble as the very earth from which God shaped it and into which He does not cease to breathe His life-giving Spirit. Look, O Mary, upon so many sons and daughters whose hope has not been extinguished: may what your Son has sown in them take root and grow, He, the living Word, who in each person asks to grow still more, to take on flesh, face, and voice. May Jubilee hope blossom in Rome and in every corner of the earth, hope in the new world God is preparing, of which you, O Virgin, are like the bud and the dawn. Set us on our way, with the haste that once moved your steps toward your cousin Elizabeth, and with the trembling eagerness with which you became an exile and pilgrim, to be blessed, yes, but blessed among all women, first disciple of your Son, mother of God-with-us. Help us to be always a Church with and among the people, leaven in the dough of a humanity crying out for justice and hope. Immaculate one, woman of infinite beauty, watch over this city, over this humanity. Point them to Jesus, lead them to Jesus, present them to Jesus. Mother, Queen of Peace, pray for us.



Report on the 6th MI international Assembly

n November 27-30, 2025, the memorial of Our Lady of the Miraculous Medal, the General Assembly of the Militia of the Immaculata (MI) gathered at the Seraphicum College in Rome. The Assembly was conducted in the context of the Jubilee Year, under the motto, "Pilgrims of Hope, with the Immaculata." Fifty delegates from twenty countries on four continents attended. The Milita of the Immaculata conducted this ordinary General Assembly in order to elect the new International President and Council for the next five years. The Assembly reelected Miguel Bordas Proszynski as the International President of the association, a position he has held since 2021. He is a layman from Spain whose family is from Poland. The laywoman Margareta Begic was elected as the International Vice-President. She had been serving as the MI National President in Croatia. Angela De Marco (Fr. Kolbe Missionaries of the Immaculata), an Italian missionary stationed in Bolivia, who had served during the previous term, was reconfirmed as the International Secretary of the MI Council. The Assembly also elected three councilors, namely, Sister Wiktoria Maria Ewa Komanska from Poland, a member of the Franciscan Sisters of the Militia of the Immaculata; Fr. Jobe Abbass, OFM Conv., from the United States, who is serving as the Assistant to the MI in Canada; and the laywoman Margherita Perchinelli from Italy, who previously served as the International Vice-President. Fr. Carlos A. Trovarelli, the Minister General of the Order of Friars Minor Conventual, will continue to serve as the MI International Spiritual Assistant. through his Delegate, Fr. Gilson Miguel Nunes, OFM Conv. Fr. Gilson was confirmed in his position following the 203rd Ordinary General Chapter of his Order, celebrated last June. Over fifty delegates—priests, religious/consecrated persons, and lay people—attended the Assembly. They came from more than twenty countries located in the Americas, Europe, Asia, and Africa. They prayed together during the Assembly and reflected on the apostolate of the Militia of the Immaculata around the world. Before starting the work of the Assembly, coinciding with the feast of the Miraculous Medal [November 27], the participants made a pilgrimage to the Shrine of Our Lady of the Miracle at the Basilica of Sant'Andrea delle Fratte in Rome. This special place is where Alphonse Ratisbonne, a Jew, was converted through

the intercession of the Virgin Mary. It is also where St. Maximilian Kolbe celebrated his first Mass at the altar of the apparition, on April 29, 1918. The visiting MI members participated in the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass there and entrusted all their work to the Immaculata. On Thursday afternoon, November 27, the participants listened to reports from the National Centers and from the various Pre-Assembly Commissions on formation, family and children, youth, and communication. On Friday, November 28, the day began with Mass presided over by the Secretary General of the Conventuals, Fr. Tomasz Szymczak, representing the Minister General. After the Mass, there was a brief report by the General Delegate, Fr. Gilson Miguel Nunes. Next, the outgoing International President, Miquel Bordas Proszynski, presented his report on the activities, mission, and internal aspects of the MI over the last four years. The MI "Protocol for the Protection of Minors and the Prevention of Abuse" was then presented. This was followed by the presentation of the financial report, together with the auditors' opinion. After lunch, the outgoing International President proposed some amendments to the General Statutes. The Assembly, however, decided to postpone the voting on his proposal until a more detailed examination could be conducted at a future Extraordinary Assembly. The day concluded with a Prayer Vigil and Eucharistic Adoration led by Fr. Andrea Paolo Scalvini, OFM Conv. On Saturday, November 29, the Delegates began the day with Mass presided over by the National Assistant to the

Mi in Poland, Fr. Piotr Szczepanski. Afterward, the Delegates elected the new Presidential Council as well as the new Board of Auditors. In the evening, they joined in the recitation of an international Rosary, praying with and for all MI members worldwide and entrusting this new stage of the MI mission to the Immaculata.

On November 30, the First Sunday of Advent, the Assembly concluded with a discussion among the Assembly members. Immediately afterward, the new Presidential Council held its first official meeting. The final event was the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass presided over by the Most Reverend Dario Gervasi, Adjunct Secretary of the Dicastery for Laity, Family and Life, and Auxiliary Bishop of Rome. He encouraged all MI members to continue their Marian apostolate, following in the footsteps of their founder, St. Maximilian Kolbe. Over the course of the Assembly, the members also renewed their Consecration to the Virgin Mary and their desire to spread this devotion to every heart, as St. Maximilian Maria Kolbe wished. Expressing the same intention, the newly elected President encouraged all members of the MI to "be passionately dedicated to the mission of evangelization throughout the world and in every environment, in communion with the Holy Church, relying on the sure and maternal intercession of the Immaculata, in this school of holiness that is the Militia of the Immaculata."





Walking with Mary in Grief

The writings of St. Maximilian Kolbe teach that Mary's will is fully united to the will of God as a fruit of her Immaculate Conception. As she was thus preserved from sin and her will never diverted from God's will, one could assume that Mary never suffered from this union. Far from it: as Simeon prophesied in Luke 2:35, "and you yourself a sword will pierce."

Her suffering did not end with the death of Jesus. Mary's love for her Son was total: like any good mother she suffered along with Him during His Passion and Death. His resurrection eased her pain as she must have been overjoyed at seeing Him once again, but she was also aware that this time with Him would be short; He was to ascend to the Father in Heaven and Mary would be left behind to endure unknown years without Him until her Earthly exile was over. If you have suffered the death of a loved one and also face the prospect of many years left on Earth, then you can empathize with Mary in her grief. For grief it is: when someone you love dies, that loss tears a hole in your soul and creates an empty space in your life that was occupied by the deceased. It was no different with Mary, regardless of her knowledge of Jesus's life and her role in it and her assured salvation.

Regardless of how long ago the loss was, like 20 years for me and the death of my own mother, or if you just experienced a loss: grief knows no expiration date. Grief takes its own time. It is the slow process by which the death wound is healed. Even after you appear to function normally, you will likely carry the loss in your heart forever. This is still grief. The wound has healed but the scar remains.





One way that can help carry the grief is to offer it to Mary. As St. Maximilian Kolbe writes on Marian consecration, "Let her make free use of you and dispose of you without limits for whatever purpose she wishes." (KW 1334) Therefore, even your grief is something that Mary can use.

In consecrating ourselves to Mary we give her everything for her use in advancing the Kingdom of the Sacred Heart (our life, our work, our state in life, our pains and sufferings, our illness.) We can also give her our grief. Perhaps it'll be just to heal ourselves, but more likely to also heal others.

We carry our grief by walking hand in hand with Mary and work out our consecration. As Christ-bearers, we can bring Him to others in grief according to our means. We can teach them St. Paul's admonition in 1 Thessalonians 4:13 to "not grieve like the rest, who have no hope." For when we walk with Mary, we allow her to use us as a paintbrush in her hands, painting brushstrokes of maternal love on hearts and souls. We become instruments of hope in her hands.

Along with the Rosary, we can also pray the Chaplet of Seven Sorrows. We console Mary for the swords that pierced her heart during her life; in turn, she takes us under her mantle, showering her maternal love on us. The Seven Sorrows Chaplet is the perfect balm to unite our grief with Mary.



I would like to congratulate Miquel Bordas Proszynski being reelected as the President, Margareta Begic, from Croatia, elected as the Vice President, Angela De Marco from Bolivia and Margherita Perchinelli from Italy, being reelected, and the new council members Sister Wiktoria Maria Ewa Komanska from Poland, and Fr. Jobe Abbass OFM Conv. representing Canada. I wish them my best and hope each of you will offer for them your prayers for a successful future. One item of concern from the Assembly is that the changes that were proposed to the MI General Statutes were postponed until a future time to be announced. I was hoping for these changes to be implemented as I believe most would have been an improvement to Council operations. Our National Directory will remain as written in the past, awaiting changes from the International Council.

The next upcoming event I will be focused on is the MI National Assembly and elections for the United States National Council that will pave the way for our next 4 years. I hope each of you will plan to attend, vote and provide your prayers of support.

I have one special request to ask each of you who would like to stay in contact with us: please provide your email address if you haven't already done so. The cost of sending out letters to all our members is a very large expense, while the funds could be better utilized, supporting our mission of bringing Mary and the MI to the world. Please consider subscribing to our MI newsletter The Knight of the Immaculata to receive each month news and updates on special events and future plans.

I would like to thank everyone for your prayers and financial support that make this ministry possible. Without all of our MI Knights we would not be able to continue to live out the legacy and desires that St. Maximilian Kolbe entrusted to us.

St. Maximilian Teaches...

During his Spiritual Exercises, in February 1920, he wrote for himself this rule of life, which he faithfully lived by (*KW* 971). It can be for us an inspiration as we begin a new year.

To be read each month.

- 1. I must be a saint, the greatest saint possible.
- 2. The greatest possible glory of God through salvation and the most perfect sanctification of oneself and of all those who live now and shall live in the future, by way of the Immaculata = MI-3.[Militia of the Immaculata Third Degree: the highest implementation of consecration to the Immaculata in the Marian movement founded by Fr. Maximilian.]
- 3. Peccatum mortale vel veniale deliberatum a priori exclude. [Exclude mortal sin or willful venial sin a priori.] Serenity about the past. Make up for wasted time with fervor.
- 4. I shall not let through a. any evil without reparation (destroying it) and b. any good that I may do, increase or contribute to in any measure.


- 5. Regula tua oboedientia [your rule is obedience.] = the Will of God through the Immaculata. You are an instrument.
- 6. Do what you are doing; and pay heed to no other things, either good or bad.
- 7. Semper quieta, amorosa actio.[Ever peaceful and love-filled action.]
- 8. Serva ordinem et ordo servabit te.[Preserve order, and order shall preserve you.]
- 9. Praeparatio, actio, conclusio.[Preparation, action, conclusion.]
- 10. Remember always that you are absolute, unconditional, unlimited, irrevocable possession and property of the Immaculata; whoever you are, whatever you have, or can do, all the "actiones" (thoughts, words, deeds) and the "pas-

siones" (pleasant, unpleasant, or indifferent things) belong entirely to her. Consequently, let her dispose of them according to her (not your) wish. So also all your intentions belong to her; therefore let her transform them, add others, take away some as she pleases (for she is incapable of violating justice). You are an instrument in her hands, therefore do solely what she wants; accept each thing from her hand. Have recourse to her in all things, like a child to his mother, entrust all things to her. Take interest in her, in her devotion, in her things, and let her take care of you and your things. Acknowledge that you received everything from her and that nothing comes from yourself. The whole fruit of your work depends on your union with her, just as she is the instrument of God's mercy. My life (each of its instants), my death (where, when, and how), and my eternity, all that is yours, O Immaculata. Do with all that whatever you please.

- 11. Omnia possum in Eo, qui me per Immaculatam confortat [I can do all things in Him who strengthens me through the Immaculata. cf. Phil 4:13].
- 12. Inner life: "Totus primo sibi et sic totus omnibus." ["First of all, be dedicated completely to your own spiritual life, so that you may give yourself completely to all."]

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

The Martyr of Charity, St. Maximilian Maria Kolbe (1894-1941), before his death in the Auschwitz concentration camp, had spent the previous twenty-three years as a priest, evangelizer, media mogul, social commentator, missionary and religious reformer. His life's work cut short at age 47, St. Kolbe nonetheless left behind an impressive body of writings. In the 1950s the English-speaking world first began reading bits and pieces of those writings translated from the original Polish, Italian and Latin. The publication of the first English critical edition, The Writings of St. Maximilian Maria Kolbe, constitutes a historic event for the English-speaking readership. The sublime inspiration of the Saint's Marian thought and spirituality transpires from every page of his writings, whether it be a treatise on the relationship between the Holy Spirit and the Immaculate Conception, an evangelization plan, a message of counsel to religious and laity, or a filial letter to his mother. His deep personal relationship with the Immaculate Virgin Mary colors and enflames nearly every page. His leitmotif is love for God, the Church, the world and all its peoples. His goal is the conversion and sanctification of that world.



Because the frenetic pace of St. Kolbe's active ministry afforded him no time to compose a theological Summa, this edition assembles together the wide scope of his extant writings into a unified synthesis. It represents a virtual magnum opus of Kolbean thought-- at one and the same

time pastoral, anthropological, philosophical, spiritual, ascetical and mystical. In the person of St. Maximilian Maria Kolbe, the first half of the twentieth century found a fresh voice fearlessly defending timeless values in the contemporary context. These two volumes give vigorous new life to this prophetic voice of truth.



January MI Intention

This year, the monthly reflections are provided by Fr. Thomas Czeck, OFM Conv., the MI-USA National Spiritual Assistant.

> O Immaculata, please intercede...

That sincere collaboration among all Christians may accelerate the process of unity and peace.

Reflection - As we celebrate Mary, the Mother of God, on January 1st, hearts and minds unite in the peace of the Madonna and child Jesus. In charity or self-sacrificing love during the Christmas season we unite in the love of God and neighbor. St. Maximilian gives us a template for how to achieve peace. "Peace with God through innocence (pure conscious, love), with one's neighbor through love, with oneself though fighting against passions and through patience." (KW 987 C) It is when we seek the will of God that we as Christians can unite and share the peace of God. When Christians work together to protect the innocent, feed the hungry, safeguard the

marginalized, and seek justice for the oppressed, we find unity, strength, and peace by self-sacrificing love. "Peace in surrender to God's Will." (KW 987 D) Even in the midst of suffering we can still find peace. "Suffer in humility for the Heart of Jesus and you shall find peace." (KW 987 D) For St. Maximilian Kolbe these are more than pious thoughts, but are lived acts of love, sacrifice, and heroic charity. He had complete trust in in the love of Mary and Jesus and lived his life as an opportunity to give witness to that love wherever he was and in any circumstances. "God allows anything that happens to you, even if it comes from other people's ill will, to your greater good. Therefore accept in peace and with love and do not worry about anything." (KW 987 D) In this New Year, may we ask Mary, the Mother of God to form our hearts to love Jesus. Through the Immaculata, we encounter that Sacred Heart of lesus where we are loved and find peace.

If it pleases you, use all that I am and have without reserve, wholly to accomplish what was said of you: "She will crush your head," and, "You alone have destroyed all heresies in the world."

Let me be a fit instrument in your immaculate and merciful hands for introducing and increasing your glory to the maximum in all the many strayed and indifferent souls, and thus help extend as far as possible the blessed Kingdom of the most Sacred Heart of Jesus. For wherever you enter, you obtain the grace of conversion and growth in holiness, since it is through your hands that all graces come to us from the most Sacred Heart of Jesus.
