President's Column

Dear Knights of the Immaculata, It is with heartfelt gratitude that I write to you members of the MI-USA on the occasion of my election as the new MI-USA National President. First, to give thanks to those who have gone before, to the former President, Ronald Rodrigues, and Vice President, Michael Wick, and all the past members of the National Council for their selfless service to the MI and the Immaculata. If I and those newly elected members of the National Council accomplish a fraction of the good they who preceded us have done, building on their legacy, I am certain our task will not be wholly in vain. I hope that Br. Francis Mary Kalvelage, may he rest easy in heaven, will not be disappointed as I try to walk in his footsteps, he who first introduced me to the work of the MI back in 1977 when he invited me to join him and the other teens and young adults for a month-long Youth Mission of the Immaculata retreat at Marytown in Kenosha, WI. He was for me the embodiment of a tireless instrument in Her hands, a true Knight of the Immaculata. He and the other friars who mentored us allowed us the privilege of fixing fences, tending bee hives, distributing day-old donuts to the less fortunate children in the poorer districts of Kenosha, and assisting with the printing of Immaculata

magazine. We learned the riches of the Catholic intellectual tradition from luminaries like the late Dr. Warren Carroll, who had just founded Christendom College. But of course, the highlight of our retreat were our nightly vigils we kept before the Blessed Sacrament leading up to our total consecration to Jesus through the Immaculata.

I also wish to acknowledge the kindness of our past MI Youth and Young Adults Director, Shevawn Pearson, who allowed me to enroll three of my six children in the summer teen retreat at Marytown in Libertyville, IL, beginning in 2003. For years I had the honor of teaching and forming teens

and young adults with her and the good Franciscan friars at Marytown. In all the years that I have taught, whether at Franciscan University of Steubenville, or Ave Maria University, or now at Ave Maria School of Law, or leading hundreds of university students to the United Nations to lobby in conjunction with the Holy See for authentic human rights, never have I enjoyed mentoring young adults so much as during the MI retreats at Marytown.

Today the Church and the world stand at a crossroad, an uncharted path lies before us. Pope Leo XIV in his encyclical, *Magnifica Humanitas* (Magnificent Humanity) explains the potential for good and the possible dangers of the AI revolution. He has shown us a way forward directing us to rebuild the "walls of Jerusalem" and be transformed in grace and not attempt to erect again a "Tower of Babel," symbolizing a pseudo-technological divinization. As the prophet Nehemiah once did, he asks us to hold in one hand a spear, and brick and mortar in the other. God willing, the MI-USA will be at the tip of that spear defending human dignity, warding off what Pope Francis referred to as a "throw-away culture" while at the same time we make secure the walls of a "civilization of love" as described by Saint Pope John Paul II in his February 2, 1994, Letter to Families.

Where True Beauty Lies

Pope Leo XIV's Homily on the Solemnity of
the Assumption of Our Lady, August 15, 2026

Dear brothers and sisters, it is with great joy that I celebrate the Solemnity of the Assumption with you once again this year. The Magisterium of the Church teaches us that Mary “having completed the course of her earthly life, was assumed body and soul into heavenly glory” (Pius XII, Apostolic Constitution *Munificentissimus Deus*, 1 November 1950) and points out to us, in this Mystery, the fulfillment of the most perfect grace that God bestowed upon her at her Immaculate Conception (cf. *ibid.*). For this reason, many works of art depict her as a beautiful young woman physically rising from the earth toward the heavens at the end of her

earthly life. These works are inspired by the scene described in the passage from the Book of Revelation that we heard in the First Reading: “A woman clothed with the sun, with the moon under her feet” (Rev 12:1), signifying that in Mary’s heart, heaven and earth, time and eternity, meet. On the surface this image seems to contrast with our experience of what the passing of the years does to us. As we age, our bodies do not become more agile, but heavier; our skin does not become fresher, but shows the signs of old age; our hair does not gain color and luster, but turns gray and then white. So, what do we have in common with the beautiful young woman depicted on the altarpieces of our churches? To understand this, we must unite the two signs we have mentioned: the incorrupt body of the Mother of God and her immaculate heart. For it is the purity of the soul that, in Mary — as in us — by the grace of God, illuminates and transfigures the whole person, leading us to the glory of Heaven. The glorification of Mary, body and soul, teaches us that our true beauty does not lie in hiding the signs of aging, but in revealing the signs of love that never end, and are even impressed on our flesh (cf. 1 Cor 13:8). With this in mind, we

are invited to reexamine many of the aesthetic standards, predominantly hedonistic and consumerist in nature, that the world imposes on us. These standards risk trapping us in burdensome expectations, causing us to waste precious energy on what does not really matter and does not last forever. In everyday life, we encounter people whose faces are marked by the years and by suffering, yet who are capable of radiating serenity, kindness and peace around them; just as we may observe others who are perhaps outwardly attractive but hard and cold at heart. It is easy to see where true beauty lies and where, on the other hand, there is still a need for conversion, forgiveness and healing. If we truly wish to discover and nurture the divine beauty that surrounds us and for which we were made, and to share it with those around us, we must learn to see it in the wrinkles of an elderly person as in the tender face of a child as well, in the maturity of an adult as in the liveliness of a young person as well, in work clothes and tools as well as in festive decorations. We must listen to the unique love stories that each of these realities tells us, recognizing in them small glimpses of heaven. Love is humanity's most beautiful adornment. Love transfigures, transforms, ennobles and lifts us up, making us light, free and close to God, even amid life's ups and downs. Reflecting on the mystery of the Assumption of the Virgin, Saint Paul VI said that to understand its meaning, "we must transform the terms we use in earthly and temporal language into superlative and absolute ones [...], to imagine the eternal on a small scale" (Homily, 15 August 1969). Regarding the encounter between the infinite and the finite in the Mother of God, Pope Francis wrote: "Mary was able to turn a stable into a home for Jesus, with poor swaddling clothes and an abundance of love" (Apostolic Exhortation *Evangelii Gaudium*, 286). The miracle that Mary, the maiden of Nazareth, experienced in her innocent heart, which led her to the glory of Heaven, is a meeting of extremes, as she herself testifies in the inspired words of the *Magnificat*, which we heard in the Gospel (cf. Lk 1:46-55). In this canticle, through the humble expressions of her faith, the Mother of God speaks to us in simple terms of the magnificent mysteries she experienced, such as God becoming man in her to save humanity, and the Eternal One revealing himself within time to reopen the path to eternity for us. At the same time, in her position as a "humble servant," Saint

Paul VI says that Mary shows us the "humble dimension" in which we too can encounter the Lord. We need not look far to find the sublimity of the Mystery we celebrate. We can encounter it wherever there is true charity. For example, in the eyes of a father and mother returning home after a long day, tired but happy to be with their children. In the faces of grandfathers and grandmothers who, despite the aches and pains of old age, are filled with unexpected energy as they care for their grandchildren. In the commitment of young people who strive to grow in morality and sincerity, ready even to go against the grain of "what everyone else does." Finally, in the daily work of so many men and women who, with faith and dedication, help bring a little bit of Heaven to earth and the earth closer to Heaven.

Dear friends, the beautiful face of Our Lady of the Assumption is unique; it transcends any possible representation, and yet, at the same time, is familiar to us. Even at this very moment, we can see her face in the people who are close to us, such as the brothers and sisters with whom, in faith, we share the daily offering of our lives. For this reason, the community of believers sees itself in the woman of the Book of Revelation, and the Second Vatican Council describes Mary as "the image and beginning of the Church, [...] as a sign of sure hope and solace" (Dogmatic Constitution *Lumen Gentium*, 68). In her holy human nature, by the grace of God, we also see our nature; therefore, we too are called to live the same grace-filled life that she lived and to share in her glory. When speaking of Christ's resurrection, Saint Augustine urged the Christians of his time to make it the compass and focal point of their lives. He said: "Christ rose from the dead so that He might never die again [...]. Change course, follow the light! Begin to rise from the very place from which he rose" (Enarratio in Psalmos, 126:7). Let us accept his invitation. Let us follow the light of the Risen Lord, changing course if necessary. Let us do so, especially today, by looking to Mary, whom God has crowned with glory in body and soul, and whom he has given to us as Mother, guide, companion on our journey, and protector on the path to Heaven.

On Some Aspects of Kolbe's Marian Spirituality

By Fr. Pio Maria - Part 1

What follows is an edited transcript of a short presentation given at the MI National Assembly, highlighting several distinctive aspects of Saint Maximilian's Marian spirituality. The presentation covered a range of ideas in rapid succession, and attendees followed along using an outline. In this article, relevant portions of that outline appear as headings at the beginning of each section. The transcript has been lightly edited for readability, and detailed references to the sources have been kept to a minimum. A rough recording of the original presentation will be made available on the Militia of the Immaculata website.

Introductory words

St. Maximilian was quick to point out that we get to know Our Lady better through prayer than through study. He said that

she's someone so elevated that, the more prideful we are in approaching her, the more stupid we could become, and that we get to know her best "on our knees." He also said that, when we do holy reading about Our Lady, if we're attentive to the fact that she's a real person next to us and who loves us, we can receive more knowledge about her than what the writer has written. So, when we come into a discussion like this, we always ask her help because, I can give you a long class, but you will know her better through docility to her own teaching of us.

Let's start with a little prayer. ... In the name of the Father, and the Son, and the Holy Spirit. Hail Mary, ... Saint Maximilian, pray for us. Get ready, now we're going to move at a fast clip. There's so much to say, but it's so, so good.

Franciscan aspects

- evangelical/missionary
- emphasis on the Immaculate Conception
- Strong on affect
- Strong on will as faculty of charity
- theology as practical, and meant to be lived and applied
- *sine proprio* [words from our vow formula, referring to our vow of poverty] - we become her *proprietas*

St. Maximilian was a **Franciscan**, and this was deeply formative for his thought.

Evangelical and missionary

Francis was the first founder of a religious Order to go on mission and the Franciscan Rule was the first rule with a chapter on missions. He restarted – almost single-handedly – missionary work in the Church. During his life, he sent friars to as many countries as he could [they were already in eleven countries at the time of his death in 1226]. From his time on, Franciscans were usually the first missionaries in new countries. “In 1492, Columbus sailed the ocean blue,” in 1493, he brought twelve Franciscans to the New World. So there's this missionary, evangelical thing, which is in our DNA, and which affects his Marian consecration.

The **Immaculate Conception**, the “golden thread,” as Kolbe saw it. This is not because other Orders don't love Our Lady but, for some reason, Our Lady has given us this golden thread to pass on. It connects our history, from the time of Blessed John Duns Scotus and it continues even now. It was always, like our badge, and we fought for it, fought for it, fought for it, and defended it. This is something which is not in de Montfort's consecration. It wasn't a dogma during de Montfort's time and does not make up a major part of his thought, but it is an essential part of Kolbe's thought.

Strong on affect and strong on the will as the faculty of charity

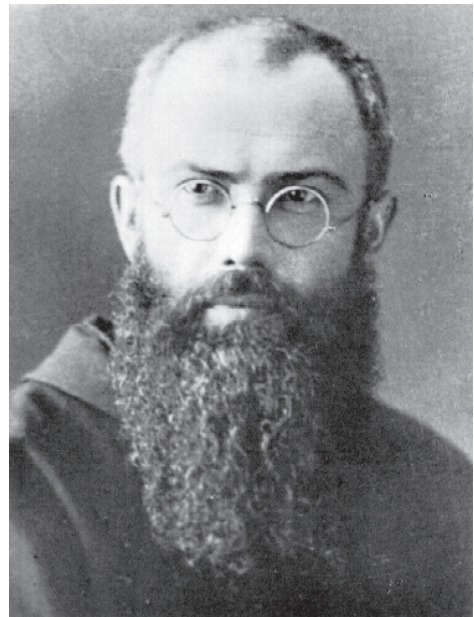
The Franciscans always had a strong focus on affection in prayer. There is a focus on the will as the faculty which allows us to love, and the will and love are higher than intellect. The intellect, in some sense, brings God down to us in a very

limited way in our minds, but love – through a simple act of the will – touches God immediately, without any mediation of perfect or less than perfect thought. So there's always a strong reliance on the will and affect in Franciscan thought. The importance of love is strong in all of Kolbe's writings. This will be touched on again later.

Theology as practical

St. Francis wasn't against study. He was just against study which only served prideful interest. There's a letter that he wrote to St. Anthony. It says, “To Brother Anthony, my bishop. It pleases me that you teach the brothers sacred theology, as long as, as it is stated in the Rule, it does not extinguish the spirit of prayer and devotion, to which all things must contribute.” So, teach theology, but it's supposed to serve prayer and devotion.

And he also said, "It pleases me that brothers study, as long as they study not primarily to teach others, but first to apply it to themselves. And once they apply, then to teach to others." So it's for the sake of application.

For Franciscans, theology is always practical. God doesn't reveal Himself just so we can know stuff, it is for application and for relationship, so that we can know Him better and love better. Kolbe said, "It does not please our Holy Father Francis to beg for a part of his love. St. Francis wants his spirit to develop without reserve. It only pleases Francis when we want for a love greater than his. Then he will have perfect joy." So we are always supposed to be growing, always supposed to be moving.

And lastly, (under this part of the outline), *sine proprio*, that's from the vow formula, to "have nothing," to profess poverty.

Kolbe doesn't use the word "slave," like de Montfort (more on this later), he says "thing and property," "res and proprietas." Franciscans don't have property, but we have become her property through consecration. We have no things, but we are her things. She has taken us to herself.

His relationship with Our Lady.

Similar to the Hypostatic Union, but with this difference...

He would say that the title "Spouse of the Holy Spirit", is a good title, because St. Francis used it. St. Francis wrote a prayer that the friars prayed fourteen times throughout each day in which he addresses Our Lady as "Daughter of the Father, Mother of the Son, and Spouse of the Holy Spirit." Kolbe said that it's a good title, but it's not strong enough. In the relationships in human life, the spousal relationship is the closest, in body and soul but, he said, it's too faint for the relationship between the Holy Spirit and Our Lady.

He says the best image that we have in which to express the union between the Holy Spirit and Our Lady is the **hypostatic union**, and this sounds heretical at first.... The hypostatic union is the union of two natures, divine and human, in the one person of Jesus. Kolbe says, we can borrow this terminology. The union of Our Lady and the Holy Spirit is like that. "Like" – he says "quasi," because he's a good theologian. (He got his doctorate in phi-

Emphasis on the union of the Holy Spirit and Our Lady

- Immaculate Conception is more about the Holy Spirit than our Our Lady

There's a special *emphasis on the union of the Holy Spirit and Our Lady*, especially connected to the Immaculate Conception. This is part of the Kolbean heritage, and a lot could be said about it. ...

For him, **the Immaculate Conception is more about the Holy Spirit than it is about Our Lady** – a more secret, personal identity of the Holy Spirit in the Trinity, which is revealed through

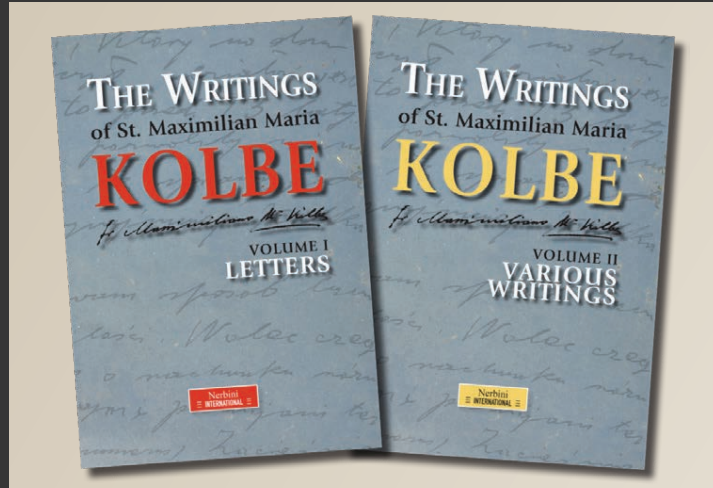
losophy when he was twenty-one years old, and his doctorate in theology when he was twenty-five years old.) Their union is like the hypostatic union, except for this important difference. In Our Lord, there's one person with two natures, but in the union of Our Lady and the Holy Spirit which began at her Immaculate Conception, there are two persons, but they are united so perfectly that Our Lady

has never experienced herself apart from the Holy Spirit, and the Holy Spirit works completely through her without any hindrance. St. Maximilian says when we encounter Our Lady, we encounter the Holy Spirit in a real, profound way. He says we venerate the Holy Spirit in a special way when we venerate Our Lady. Our consecration plunges us into a special relationship with the Holy Spirit. Traditional Catholic theology holds that Mary mediates grace because she helped acquire grace. She's Mediatrix because she's Co-redemptrix. Kolbe agrees, but he also locates this mediation in the union of these two at her Immaculate Conception. **She mediates grace because she's the Spouse of the Holy Spirit**, and He is the source of all the grace we receive..., it all comes through Him. Kolbe streamlines this thought: because she is one with the Holy Spirit, of course she distributes grace.¹

So that was something about the special relationship of the Immaculata to the Holy Spirit in St. Maximilian's thought. *(To be continued)*

[1] Here is a section from his writings which touches on the ideas just mentioned in the presentation: "[The Holy Spirit] is in the Immaculata, as the Second Person of the Most Holy Trinity, the Son of God, is in Jesus, but with this difference: that in Jesus there are two natures, the divine and the human, and a single person, the divine. The nature and person of the Immaculata, instead, are set apart from the nature and person of the Holy Spirit. This union, however, is so ineffable and so perfect that the Holy Spirit only works through the Immaculata, His Bride. Accordingly, she is the Mediatrix of all graces of the Holy Spirit. Given that each grace is a gift from God the Father through the Son and the Holy Spirit, there is no grace that does not belong to the Immaculata, given to her for her to dispose of freely.

"Therefore, by venerating the Immaculata, we venerate in a very special way the Holy Spirit, and just as grace comes to us from the Father through the Son and the Holy Spirit, so rightly the fruits of this grace ascend to the Father in reverse order, that through the Holy Spirit and the Son, that is to say through the Immaculata and Jesus." (KW 634)



The Definitive English Edition!

The Martyr of Charity, St. Maximilian Maria Kolbe (1894-1941), before his death in the Auschwitz concentration camp, had spent the previous twenty-three years as a priest, evangelizer, media mogul, social commentator, missionary and religious reformer. His deep personal relationship with the Immaculate Virgin Mary colors and enflames nearly every page. His leitmotif is love for God, the Church, the world and all its peoples. His goal is the conversion and sanctification of that world.



I heartily welcome this first English critical edition of The Writings of St. Maximilian Maria Kolbe. Its pages are suffused with Christian hope. Under the general editorship of Antonella Di Piazza, FKMI, the text has meticulous footnotes, comprehensive indices, and a brilliant introduction by the Fr. Giuseppe Simbula, OFM Conv. Reflection - Maximilian Kolbe began missionary work in Japan not knowing Japanese and yet, within a month, he began publishing a magazine, *Mugenzai no Seibo no Kishi*, in Japanese. The magazine would be his tool to reach people and begin to teach them about Christianity and the Immaculata. Maximilian answers and clarifies concerns sent in by readers. In his article, "The Religion of Love", he stated that he is teaching about a religion of love. "Hatred divides, separates and destroys, while to the contrary, love unites, brings about peace, and is constructive. It is not strange that only love manages always to render men perfect and, therefore, that only

the religion that teaches love of God and neighbor can perfect men. The religion of Jesus Christ is really the religion of love, of perfect love, and is evident in the holy words of Jesus Christ. ... It can be said that if this religion is spread around the world, the world would become paradise." (KW 1205) Later, in his article "Patroness of Missions," he gives us the model which will mold us in this love. "What matters is not, in fact, what we do, but the way, the intention, and the love with which we do it... St. Thérèse called herself 'little flower of the Immaculata' and acknowledged that she was raised by the Immaculata. We also are..., and she will teach us unlimited trust in the merciful love of God, of which she is the embodiment." (KW 1263) An example of a life focused on love and molded by the Immaculata was Br. Martin Schmitz, OFM Conv., who was the last of the founding friars of Marytown in Crystal Lake IL in 1948. Br. Martin died peacefully on August 24, 2026 in the loving presence of the Little Sisters of the Poor. When Br. Martin was 17, he joined the



Franciscans and was the first establishing class of Marytown, founded on September 15, 1948. Br. Martin, served the Immaculata for his whole religious life of 77 years. He joined us for our Provincial Chapter at the end of July and was blessed by our Minister General, Fr. Carlos Alberto Trovarelli OFM Conv., during this time.

We trust in Our Blessed Mother, for whom Br. Martin had a deep devotion, to intercede for him and lead him into his eternal reward in heaven. May St. Francis, St. Maximilian Kolbe, and all the saints and angels, be there to welcome him!

For wherever you enter, you obtain the grace of conversion and growth in holiness, since it is through your hands that all graces come to us from the most Sacred Heart of Jesus.
